

SocNet98 - 20th Anniversary History and Reflections








- SocNet'98 was initiated by Menno van Veen (Groningen) und Thomas Trenczek (Jena) during an international week of both universities in June 1998 in Groningen.
- The inaugural meeting of the international coordinators invited has been conducted
 November 4th 6th, 1998 in Jena with participants of Groningen (Menno van Veen and Theo Koning), Jena (Thomas Trenczek), Newcastle (Henry Ross), Porsgrunn (Ketil Eide), Rovaniemi (Iiris Happo), Bremen (Lutz Walk) and Emden (Gertrud Cuers).
- The second coordinators conferences in Jan. 2001 in Porsgrunn (Norway) has been hosted by Veslemøy Wiese (Porsgrunn). In 2001, our partners in Odense (Nicolai Paulsen) und Hasselt (Ilse Vanderstukken) joined the network.
- In the following years St. Pölten (Peter Pantucek), Budeovice (Adéla Mojžíšová), Leuven (Maurits Wysmans), Linz (Carolyn Mayr) and Malaga (María Luisa Gomez Jiménez) have become a member of the network.



Didde Auring: I remember the incident in Rovaniemi where we were told not to walk to the university if the temperature was under -25 degrees C. - The idea and goal of the network was not only to intensify the bilateral exchange but to establish a broader network of European university schools of social work that **fosters exchange of students and lecturers** in particular.
- Since the beginning, the most important part of our network activities was
 - the organization of the International University Week (IUW) each year
 - in 2018 we were able to host the 20th IUW in Bournemouth, Bremen, Jena and Porsgrunn.

Main Activities:

- International University Week (IUW) hosted by 3-4 partners each summer semester.
- Annual coordinators meeting hosted by one of the partners each year in winter semester
- Individual teachers exchange/teaching activities under the Erasmus umbrella

- Beyond fostering students and teachers exchange and personal networking, within the first 10 years the SocNet98 meetings and discussions especially focussed on
 - Comparison of university life, curricula and establishing joint programs (e.g. European Master)
 - finding a name for our network:

Socrates Network of European University Schools of Social Work (SocNet98)

(The abbreviation "Soc" stands for both Socrates a well as Social)

- essential bylaws and expectations regarding new members
- the question whether or not the network should stay rather small as a group of
 7-8 partner universities or should we open up the network and grow.
- Since 1998, there have been more than 20 universities participation in the network.
- Some partners (Gabrovo, Lille, Malaga, Newcastle, Rovaniemi, Umea, Waterford) have left the network for different reasons.



20th anniversary - Reflections of "old friends" of the first and second generation*:

Menno van Veen (Groningen): From the start my aim was not just establishing international exchange in itself, not just because there was money available, not just because it feels like a good idea. The main goal was – for me – creating chances for students and for teachers to discover that their own ideas, their way of looking at social work, differ from people in other countries. That much beliefs and ways of working are a product of their own history and culture. Literally crossing borders, thinking out of the box, experience other cultural perspectives. Working within the frame of our network was not only just working per se, it also was about meeting people and develop warm and friendly relations. Over the years I made some good acquaintances and even friends. Besides the work we had time to have a good meal, to socialize and even to party now and then. Thinking back at these activities puts a smile on my face

Didde Auring (Odense): I recall the agendas as being heavily loaded. It seems to me that you often volunteered to be chairman at the meetings - maybe to make sure that we had time enough to discuss all the items of the agenda. And you doing a great, constructive, but sometimes thankless job!

All in all I remember the Network Meetings as industrious, constructive, bubbling and only once in a while boring! We had a good balance between working hours and time to socialize. We got to know each other well in the group and it was sad when people stopped for whatever reason.


20th anniversary - Reflections of "old friends" of the first and second generation*:

liris Happo (Rovaniemi): I had a great pleasure to be part of SocNet98 almost ten years. Before my first meeting, I did not know, what to expect. I thought that it would be normal international cooperation between universities, but it was something beyond that. Indeed, we did cooperate a lot. We had International University Weeks every year and we helped our students to find exchange places etc. But it wasn't cooperation between our universities, it was cooperation between friends. ... For me, it was also a possibility to develop professionally. I learned a lot about social work. In addition, I had a chance to get to know educational systems in different countries and visit places and homes all over Europa. It was educational but above all it was memorable, valuable experiences.

Ilse Vanderstukken (Hasselt): I really appreciate the initiatives of all colleagues, over these 20 years. Menno van Veen and Thomas Trenczek planted a tree, like all the trees in his beautiful garden, and after 20 years his tree still has beautiful flowers. A handshake and a smile to the colleagues of the network taking care for it during the whole period, just like Thomas. It was a pleasure to take part of this network, to love it, to spread it, and to know that our universities need strong social workers, well prepared, ready to mediate, to support, to help, to manage, to empower European social work!!!

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
20th anniversary - Reflections of "old friends" of the first and second generation*:

It is this mindset, attitude and commitment of us, the SocNet98 coordinators that keeps the network alive and prospering. It was good meeting you and staying in touch all over the years....
